"The Urban Tale of a Hippo" is a visionary musical performance that explores the interconnectedness of humans, animals, and the environment. The performance is set in a haze-filled factory, which creates a disorienting and atmospheric space. The audience is invited to navigate the haze, using their senses to explore the soundscape and experience the transformation of the world around them.

The music is a blend of live instruments and electronics, creating a rich and textured soundscape. The instruments are often deconstructed and manipulated, creating unexpected and evocative sounds. The electronics are used to create a sense of space and movement, immersing the audience in the performance.

The performance celebrates multiplicity, rejecting singular narratives and embracing the chaotic tapestry of existence. The audience navigates the foggy space, individually constructing their own meaning from the complexity of sounds and movements, much like how Deleuze and Guattari encourage readers to engage with their texts in a non-linear, open-ended fashion.

The fusion of instruments and electronics, the blurring of stage and audience space, and the emphasis on sonic narrative all challenge traditional hierarchies. This reflects Deleuze and Guattari's critique of power structures and their vision for a more decentralized, rhizomatic world, where connections and flows take precedence over fixed forms and predetermined paths.

In essence, "The Urban Tale of a Hippo" isn't just a concert, a music theater or a site specific auditory exploration, it's a philosophical journey through sound, light, space and movement, inviting audiences to embrace the complexity of our interconnected world, where humans and animals, nature and technology, past and future weave together in a dynamic, ever-evolving dance.
